REMARKS

Our clothing not only makes a statement about ourselves, but also invites others to form an opinion about us. In fact, it's been demonstrated through scientific research that our clothes impact us more than we realize. Adam Galinsky, professor at Columbia Business School in New York City, is a social psychologist who has studied such things. Galinsky's research shows that when a person dresses more professionally, then he or she will be more attentive and detail-oriented. More tasks will get finished. What's more: people will perceive that person with a higher regard. If a person wears a respected physician's white lab coat, says Galinsky, even temporarily as "dress up," that person will act more focused. Perhaps it's true: "clothes make the man." And woman!

As you read the Bible, notice the role clothes play in the story. For example, in Exodus 28 & Leviticus 8, we read about the priestly garments. The tunic, the robe, and the undergarments are all important for differentiating the priests in their identity and role. Tradition claims that the outer garments were re-used by multiple priests as much as possible; even the undergarments were considered too holy to throw away. So, what happened with them? Those undergarments were washed and then cut into smaller pieces. The smaller pieces were then repurposed: some as swaddling clothes, and others as burial linens.

Imagine with me: the garments formerly worn by a faithful Hebrew priest being repurposed for our Lord Jesus, either in His manger (Luke 2:7) or in His tomb (Luke 23:53).

We know what it means for clothes to take on a new life. Do you have any garments previously worn by a family member? I have one of my Granddad's sweaters. He wore it, and it fits me now. When I put it on, naturally I think about him and our family. The best kinds of "hand-me-downs" have a story and plenty of wear.

You and I have a "hand-me-down" faith. We neither designed it, nor did we sew it together. Instead, our Creator God established a loving covenant with us through Jesus Christ, giving us the fabric of Christian discipleship. The Church has sought to pass along this wardrobe from one generation to the next. In Colossians 3:12, the Apostle Paul's encouragement is clear: "to clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience." In the same way that you choose what to wear every day, put that some sort of intentionality into wearing these virtues.

Since 1985, Men's Wearhouse television commercials have ended, "You're going to like the way you look. I guarantee it." That's a strong statement! But here's an even better one: clothe yourself with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, and you will sense God's work of transformation happening deep within your life.

This will not only make a statement about yourself, but also the opinion others form about you. After all, it's not just about how we look on the outside, but who we are on the inside.

CHURCH HISTORY

"Looking back, moving forward"

Methodists love to sing. It is in our spiritual DNA. Music formed a foundational pillar of the 18th century Methodist revival. Thanks to the creative talents of Charles Wesley, John Wesley's younger brother, Methodists enjoyed a steady supply of new spiritual songs. Through Charles Wesley's hymns, Methodists still sing our theology.

In the spring of 1738, both Wesley brothers had strong religious awakenings. The anniversary of Charles Wesley's experience produced one of our greatest Christmas hymns "Hark the Herald Angels Sing." This productive period also saw his composition of the favorite Easter hymn "Christ the Lord is Risen today."



In 1739, John Wesley purchased the lease on a London Foundry, a former brass cannon producer. After renovations, the building accommodated 1500 worshipers. It became Methodism's first London chapel. To mark the occasion, Wesley prepared a 1739 hymnbook called Hymns and Sacred Poems. It published for the first time Charles Wesley's new hymn "Christ the Lord is Risen Today."

Originally it had eleven stanzas that have been edited to six in most hymnals. The repeating "Alleluia" was a 19th century addition and captures the exhilaration of Easter. A more recent alteration changed "Sons of men and angels say" to "Earth and heaven in chorus say" making the language inclusive. Other changes to the text have been minor.

The hymn originally followed the English custom of being sung to different tunes. In 1905 the Methodist Hymnal permanently matched it to "Easter Tune" which we sing today. This tune first appeared in an early 18th Century German collection called Lyra Davidica, but sadly the composer's name has been lost.

There is much to love about this Wesley hymn. For one it is written in the present tense. It does not say that Christ rose or has risen. It boldly asserts that Christ is risen today. Easter is proclaimed not an ancient event but a present reality. This hymn includes modern worshipers within the company of resurrection witnesses.

The phrase "made like him like him we rise" is also present tense. It conveys a hope for God's transforming power in the present hour. The hymn lifts us from whatever troubles we face, even death, to everlasting life.

I can't help hearing a sermon in this text. Wesley calls us to action. The skies are exciting, but we must first be willing to follow Christ to the cross and the grave. Only then can we share our Lord's final triumphant victory. With echoes of Paul's first epistle to the Corinthians (15:55) the text taunts, "Where's thy victory, boasting grave?"

The final stanza promises that if we are made like Christ and follow his example we can know everlasting life. That is the Easter hope. To know Christ died for us enables us to endure and overcome suffering and death. Thanks to Jesus' resurrection we are empowered, "Thus to sing and thus to love, Alleluia, Alleluia"

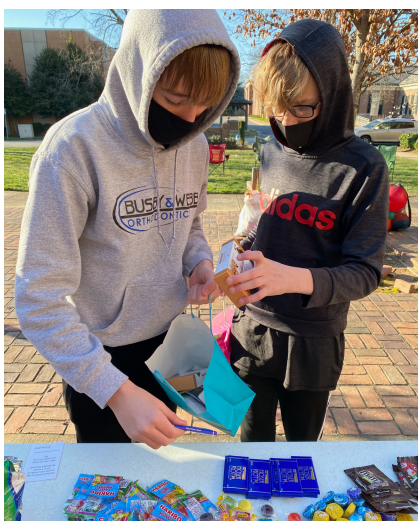

IN-PERSON WORSHIP RESUMES!



HOW DO I SIGN UP FOR IN-PERSON WORSHIP?

Worship sign-ups on Sign Up Genius will go live on Monday mornings at 9am for the following Sunday- you can find the link at fumcsalisbury.org or via social media. You can also sign up by calling the church office at (704)636-3121. *[For April 11, Sign Up Genius is already, and you can call the church to register.]*

WHAT COVID-19 PRECAUTIONS WILL THERE BE?

When you arrive, you'll complete a quick health screening, including a temperature check. Please continue to follow the 3 W's: wash your hands frequently, wear a face mask, wait: keep 6 feet apart. For now, we need to refrain from shaking hands and hugging one another. Offering plates are available in the narthex rather than passing offering plates during the service. People who are not from the same household are encouraged to keep physical distance in the pews, and capacity (for now!) is limited to 125 worshippers (plus the people leading & serving)- about 1/3 of our capacity.

WHAT WILL THE IN-PERSON WORSHIP SERVICE BE LIKE?

The worship liturgy will still follow the traditional four-fold pattern: gathering, proclamation of the Word, response to the Word, and departure to serve. The elements of the service will shift around a little bit for two reasons. First, we need to adapt for the livestream worshippers, including those we are hoping to reach who do not have a church home (see more below). Second, we still need to take seriously the research about how germs are spread in the air. This has 2 impacts: reducing the call-and-response portions of the liturgy, and singing will come just before the end of the service.

WILL THERE BE A NURSERY FOR CHILDREN FOR INFANTS AND TODDLERS?

YES, and we look forward to welcoming families.

WHAT WILL THE LIVESTREAM WORSHIP BE LIKE?

The livestream service on the church's YouTube page will begin at 11:15 am with an online-friendly greeting, and then catch up with what's happening in the Sanctuary. A recording will then be posted on YouTube to watch anytime. Like most other congregations, we have learned a tremendous amount over the past year regarding online worship. As we continue to experiment and adapt, we look forward to the online platform being both a way to nurture current disciples and also make new disciples.

All services are provided free of charge to the residential clients.

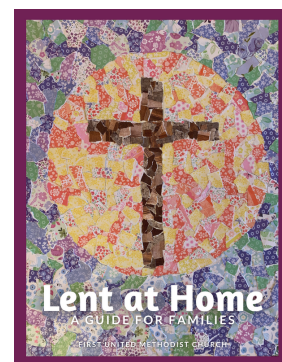
