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FROM THE PASTOR

Re:Marks

You have a story to tell, and people are curious to hear it. But do we know how to tell our story?

Storytelling is at the heart of Easter. After Jesus appeared to Mary Magdalene outside the empty tomb, Mary went and announced the disciples "I have seen the Lord," giving details about what Jesus said (John 20:11-18). In another version of the story, Mary Magdalene was joined by Mary the mother of James, and Salome on that morning (Mark 16:1-8). And instead of seeing Jesus, they saw a young man, presumably an angel of the Lord. The women were instructed to tell the disciples about Jesus' resurrection, but "terror and amazement had seized them; and they said nothing to anyone, for they were afraid" (verse 8). Obviously, the word got out eventually. But for a time, fear overwhelmed them from telling their story.

I'm wondering if fear prevents you from telling your story. Fear of ridicule, fear of being misunderstood, fear of being rejected, or even fear of being heard with indifference – these are some of the common fears preventing Christians today from sharing their story of God's goodness. If this is the case for you, know that you are not the only one. An uncountable number of Christians have kept their story to themselves. Someone may hide behind claiming, "my faith is personal." True, your faith is personal; but it is never private. The impact of God's love on your life ought to spill out and impact others. No matter whether you are in introvert or an extrovert, or what your Myers-Briggs type may be, or any other way that you've come to know your own personality, you have a story to tell!

I challenge you to wrestle with the following three questions:

- 1. Why does God matter to you? Write down 1 or 2 sentences to summarize it.
- 2. How is God working through First United Methodist Church? Again, write down a few ideas.
- 3. Who are people with whom you come into contact regularly, especially people outside of church who find you to be a trustworthy person? *Write down their names*.

If you have a response to all three questions, then you are on your way toward knowing your story. Imagine sharing that story, not in a pushy, obtrusive, knocking-on-doors sort of way. Instead, share that story in the context of genuine relationships when questions about life naturally pop up. Just about every person goes about his/her day wondering about life's meaning, the nature of suffering, how their relationships could improve, or how they can navigate decision-making. Listen to your friends tell their story first. Perhaps your story, by God's grace, is exactly what your friend needs to hear.

In 1896, hymn writer H. Ernest Nichol wrote:

"We've a story to tell to the nations, that shall turn their hearts to the right, a story of truth and mercy, a story of peace and light..."

In 2023, we've a story to tell our friends here in Salisbury and Rowan County. May your story of truth and mercy, of peace and light, find its way from your heart to your neighbor's.

Holy Ceek at FUMC



Palm Sunday marks the beginning of Holy Week. The procession with palms (already observed in Jerusalem in the fourth century) calls to mind the triumphal entry of Jesus, our Lord and King, into Jerusalem.

Palm Sunday is unique in having two Gospel readings. Originally there were two distinct liturgies. The palms were blessed and the Triumphal Entry Gospel was read outside of the church building. The door of the church represented the gate through which Jesus entered the city. We will gather in the Columbarium to begin worship on Palm Sunday – this is particularly important for two reasons:

- 1) the columbarium, being associated with death, offers us a foreshadowing of the events that will come later in Holy Week
- 2) we will collectively process into the Sanctuary singing "Hosanna!" (Which translates "Lord, save us!") and waving our palm fronds. The procession is fundamentally an act of worship, witness, and devotion to our Lord.

The purpose of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem was to fulfill His Father's will;

thus it is fitting that this service continues with the reading of the Passion Gospel in which the whole story of the week is anticipated. The emphasis of the liturgy turns to the days that lie ahead in Holy Week. We who hail Jesus as King one moment, may in the next deny Him, even joining with the crowd in shouting, "Crucify Him!"


SENTEN PRAYER STATIONS

Good Friday marks the second part of the Holy *Triduum* (the sacred Three Days) of the Paschal (Passover) mystery, which culminates on Easter. This most somber of all days is appropriately marked by fasting, abstinence, and penitence, leading us to focus on Jesus and His sacrificial death upon the Cross. Some churches do not use musical instruments or bells on this day; however, this year's Good Friday liturgy will feature a **Service of Passion Readings and Music**, similar to a Lenten "Lessons and Carols" service. This service will be held at noon, in remembrance that Jesus suffered on the cross for 6 hours, from approximately 9 am until 3 pm.

The bare, stark appearance of the darkened Sanctuary will serve as a reminder of the solemnity and sorrow of the day. The Lord of Life was rejected, mocked, scourged, and then put to death on the Cross. We are reminded of the role which our own sin played in His suffering and agony, as Christ took all sin upon Himself in obedience to the Father's will. By the Cross of Christ we are redeemed, set free from bondage to sin and death. The Cross is a sign of God's never-ending love for us. It is a sign of life, in the midst of death.




Coming Soon: First Methodist Day!

Church History

"looking back... moving forward"

Methodism began in Britain and in the American Colonies as an 18th-century spiritual renewal movement within the Church of England. The Revolutionary War changed that. Most Episcopal priests either returned to England or moved to Canada after the war. In their absence, Methodist lay preachers could not baptize or celebrate Holy Communion. John Wesley, the father of Methodism, strongly believed in sacramental ministry. He reluctantly approved establishing a Methodist church in America. At Christmas in 1784, Methodist lay preachers met in Baltimore, Maryland, and created the Methodist Episcopal Church.

That Christmas conference identified several joint mission projects. First, there were few educational opportunities on the American frontier. The conference approved establishing a college for young men. They named it Cokesbury in honor of their first bishops: Thomas Coke and Francis Asbury. A second mission involved the newly ordained clergy. Some superannuated (retired) at that conference. These "worn-out" preachers had no pension and needed financial support. Thomas Coke soon left America and the burden for raising money fell on Asbury. He referred to himself as a bishop and a beggar.

Over the next two centuries, laity joined the clergy in equal numbers as voting members at all conferences. Circuit riders and camp meetings swelled church membership rolls. Methodists became the dominant American Protestant denomination by mid-1850. Yet in spite of numerical growth, the need for financial support of conference approved ministries remained constant.

The Methodist Episcopal Church and its successor denominations attempted to develop fair and equitable ways for local congregations to support the general church budget. They tried multiple formulas. Some annual conferences based apportionment giving on local church membership. That had a negative impact on evangelism. Another formula was based on each local church's total budget. That placed an unfair burden on churches engaged in major building projects or significant mission outreach programs.

Fortunately, Methodists excelled at record keeping. Francis Asbury established a nationwide network of class leaders, circuit stewards, book stewards, exhorters, local preachers, circuit riders, and presiding elders. They conducted quarterly meetings, annual conferences, and a quadrennial general conference. Each entity produced detailed statistical reports. The general church kept and published them all. It is these reports that still provide the data for our modern apportionment system.

Each pastor annually submits to the annual conference an account of all local disbursements. These reports are published in the Conference Journal. The amounts are divided into categories such as salaries, operating expense, programs, debt retirement, mission outreach, and apportionments paid. The current

apportionment formula for the conference budget is based only on the expenses all churches share in common. These include salaries and benefits, church programs, and basic overhead expenses like utilities. Outreach missions and major building projects are excluded from this formula.

Our conference budget is approved by the elected lay delegates from every pastoral charge and the clergy conference members. For 2023, the Western North Carolina Conference budget is \$15.5 million or 10% less than the 2022 budget. Every church, big or small, pays the same decimal formula or percentage of that amount based on its three-year rolling average of core line-item expenses. Every congregation has voice and vote in approving the ministries we do together. Each congregation pays its fair share of the expense. Through the apportionment, we are united both in name and in our common mission to the world.
