What difference does Easter make?

This year, the month of April is squarely within Eastertide, the season between Easter Day and Pentecost. In 2024, those dates are March 31 and May 19, respectively. So, during "the Great Fifty Days" of Easter, let's think together about the difference Easter makes. What impact does Jesus' resurrection nearly 2,000 years ago have for us today? Here are at least three ways:

1. Easter gives us a "touchable faith."

People in different lands and eras have long concocted ideas about the origins of life. Yet we humbly assert that the Lord, the Creator of all that exists, interacted with us: first, through covenant with ancient Israel, and then, through Jesus Christ. Before Christ, faith was more about dutifully following religious practices. During Christ's earthly ministry, faith was refocused. After Christ, namely after his resurrection, faith became touchable. Remember what happened on Easter with the disciples, and then later in the week with Thomas – the resurrected Christ appeared in the flesh, and showed them the scars from His crucifixion (John 20:19-29). Jesus Christ was and is the tangible reality of God's love defeating sin, evil, and death. Those first disciples could touch Him!

People today in different lands come up with rationale not to believe in anything. Yet they can look at the Church's ministry, because at our best we offer a touchable faith.

2. Easter answers the question about life after death.

People in different lands and eras have pondered ideas about what happens after this life. Does life consist only of our flesh and bones? Is there more? Scientific analysis can only go so far. This Easter faith that became touchable now resonates on the inside of our existence, because Jesus Christ, who was dead, was now alive in front of the apostles. The resurrection does not simply give us a good feeling about life after death; the resurrection gives positive testimony about God's grace. As Peter wrote, by Jesus Christ's "great mercy, we have been born anew to a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead (1 Peter 1:3-4)." We now live with Easter answers to those questions.

3. Easter offers perspective on the big mysteries.

People in different lands and eras have pondered the big mysteries about suffering, tragedy, and relationships. And we still do today. With deep gratitude to God's faithfulness, we are granted perspective on those mysteries. Simple answers elude us, yet the resurrection permits us to see more clearly. God did not allow the devious religious & political leaders, who evidently felt threatened, to have the last word on Jesus with the crucifixion. Through the empty tomb, God found victory then, and God continues to bring good out of bad, healing out of pain, and life out of death. We trust in Jesus, who is seated on the heavenly throne and says, "See, I am making all things new (Revelation 21:5)."

Into these days of April, I hope you prayerfully ask, "What difference does Easter make?" Ask, not from a cynical standpoint, but from a posture of faith seeking understanding. When you do, know

that I am asking, too. Let's think together in these three ways. When we do, in this land and at this time, we will experience a fresh experience of Easter joy.

Church History

Methodist conferencing began in 1744. John Wesley called together five clergymen to answer three questions: What to teach? How to teach? What to do? They began their deliberations after an extended period of prayer.

In late April and early May 2024, 862 United Methodist delegates from around the globe will gather in Charlotte, NC, to continue this tradition. 55% are from the United States, 32% from Africa, 6% from the Philippines, and 4.6% from Europe. Half are clergy and half are laity. They speak 20 different languages and represent our world's cultural diversity. This year's conference theme comes from Psalm 46:10, "And Know that I am God."

This General Conference follows closely on the heels of church disaffiliations. About 25% of our local churches have left the UMC. Some left to unite with conservative denominations. Some churches joined more progressive denominations, and some became independent. Their exodus means the General Conference must make major cuts in our proposed worldwide budget.

Following Wesley's example, the General Conference will have multiple opportunities for worship and reflection. The delegates are also charged with perfecting our Book of Discipline (BOD) and creating a better church. Proposed changes fall under the general heading of "what to do." Our core theology is restricted and cannot be changed.

Petitions to amend the BOD come from organizations, clergy members, and/or lay members of the UMC. One set of petitions point Methodism in a major new direction.

In the last 50 years, human sexuality has deeply divided our denomination. Faithful Christians do not agree on matters of gender and sexuality. Our diversity leads to different interpretations of Holy Scripture. Prior to 1972, the BOD did not mention homosexuality. Some new petitions propose removing the language that was added at that time, removing all negative references to homosexuality from the BOD. If approved, that would leave the question of affirming individuals of all sexual orientations up to each local church member, congregation, and annual conference.

Another petition would divide the UMC into regions. Each region would have the separate authority to adopt social principles consistent with its cultural norms. The United States would be one of those regions.

Adopting these new petitions would allow the entire denomination to stop arguing about sexual orientation and focus instead on the mission of Christ. Such a change would make room in the UMC for everyone including progressives, moderates, and conservatives. The United Methodist Church has historically encouraged members to "think and let think." We insist on unity around our core doctrines, but we extend liberty and love in matters of faith beyond these essentials.

For the moment, all petitions are only proposals. Delegates will prayerfully consider each one. If approved, establishing regional groupings within the UMC will require a constitutional amendment. Our local church laity and clergy delegates would then vote on that constitutional change at our 2025 Annual Conference.

Methodists are not expected to think alike. We are a big family. Families sometimes disagree. But John Wesley said, "we do not have to think alike. We do have to love alike."



Donations of Pots & Pans Needed






