Re:Marks

Many years ago, a wooden Nativity scene was constructed on the front lawn of a community church. The pastor, Rev. Matthews, looked out his parsonage window, grateful for those kind church members reconstructing the scene once again.

The air was especially cold that early December day, the wind and snow swirling all around. School let out, and the children made their way down the sidewalk, like they always did. This time, however, they were all captivated by what was being built in the church's lawn. Rev. Matthews couldn't help but notice the children lingering for several moments. One by one, a child would peal away and continue walking down the snowy sidewalk, leaving just one girl standing alone.

This young girl was around age 6. She stood at the Nativity scene get its finishing touches, including the arrangement of the plastic light-up statues. The wind caused the little girl's coat to fly open; she seemed completely unaware of the weather. Her attention was focused on who was arriving... First, the barnyard animals. Then the shepherds, and the magi. Eventually, Mary and Joseph with an empty feeding trough. One of the church members placed some fresh hay in there.And then gently lay the last one, the focus of the entire Nativity scene.

What Rev. Matthews saw next mesmerized him. The young girl grew excited! She quickly took off her blue woolen head scarf. The wind almost caused the scarf to fly out of her hands, but she held on tightly, enough to wrap her scarf around the little statue of Baby Jesus. She then patted the baby, kissed Him on the cheek, and then set off skipping down the snowy sidewalk.

Rev. Matthews recalled, "As I watched, I realized that Christmas had come once again."

If you're like me, then you're ready for Christmas to come again.

We're ready for the heart-warming moments of kindness. Bring on the inspiring scenes of compassion. And not the fluff, the empty ornaments pretending to be Christmas. For children, waiting for Christmas is hard. For adults, recognizing Christmas may be even harder.

Christina Rosetti's poem, "Love Came Down at Christmas," has become a cherished Christmas Carol.

Love came down at Christmas; Love all lovely, Love Divine; Love was born at Christmas; Star and Angels gave the sign.

Worship we the Godhead; Love Incarnate, Love Divine, Worship we our Jesus; But wherewith for sacred sign?

Love shall be our token; Love be yours and love be mine, Love to God and all men; Love for plea and gift and sign.

Long ago, Love came down once and for all. This Advent season, we are given the chance again to anticipate the Nativity. When Love appears, don't miss it!

Church History

This month's article might be titled "A Tale of Two Christmases." One is secular and the other sacred. Their calendars overlap, but they have major differences.

Our secular Christmas has deep roots that go all the way back to pagan Rome. The start of the slow lengthening of daylight hours brought on weeks of late December parties and festivities. European cultures also enjoyed a mid-winter celebration of strong drink, rich food, and leisure living.

Today's secular Christmas celebration usually begins the day after Thanksgiving. Commonly known as Black Friday, merchants launch their busiest commercial season. During the remainder of November and most of December, we sing about snow predictions, an enchanted red-nosed reindeer, and a desire to spend nostalgic time with family and friends. It is the season of jolly little elves piloting flying sleighs, decorated evergreen trees, and hanging mistletoe. Delicious food, wrapped packages, and greeting cards are shared by both saints and sinners.

Alongside this secular season is a very different Christmas tradition. The church calls it Advent from the Latin word "adventus" meaning "coming" or "arrival." In ancient Greece, it announced the coming of the emperor. In Christian tradition, it became a time to prepare spiritually for the coming of the Christ child.

The Advent season runs for four weeks including four Sundays prior to December 25th. Depending on the fluctuating calendar, it can begin in late November or early December. Each Sunday has a distinctive emphasis. The first Sunday celebrates Christ's second coming. The next two Sundays focus on John the Baptist. The events immediately preceding the birth of Jesus occupy the fourth Sunday.

Often an Advent wreath marks each Sunday. It is an evergreen wreath with four purple candles plus a central white Christ candle added on Christmas Day. Evergreen represents eternal life. Each candle traces the gradual approach of Christ's light to the world. In some churches, the candles represent hope, peace, joy, and love. The third Sunday "Joy candle" is frequently pink.

Churches may provide devotional aids for private use during Advent. Some churches recommend fasting. The emphasis is not on the birth of Jesus. That comes later. The focus of Advent is on preparation to receive the coming Savior.

December 25th and the twelve days afterward celebrate Christmas. Congregations sing familiar carols and tell the nativity story. This season ends with Epiphany, celebrated on on January 6th, when we celebrate the arrival of the Wise Men.

Singing carols after Christmas Day often feels odd to people accustomed to ending the secular celebration on December 26th. That is when many people take down the decorations, exchange unwanted gifts, and take advantage of store-wide sales. And yet, it is only after four weeks of Advent preparation that we can finally sing "come and worship, Worship Christ the Newborn King." Our church will mark this religious celebration with a Sunday school hour of carol singing on December 31st. If you want to put Christ back into your Christmas, the last days of December is a good time to do that.



Rowan Helping Ministries Building Dedication

Exciting changes are taking place at Rowan Helping Ministries!

In October, the non-profit organization unveiled 12 new transitional housing apartments and new program space built to help more homeless citizens return to stable, permanent homes and self-sufficiency. These new facilities are located behind the agency's original building, The Ralph W. Ketner Crisis Assistance Center on North Long Street, and across from the Salisbury Train Station.



The new transitional apartments, called Eagle's Nest III, bring the agency's total number of transitional units to 22. Nine of the new units are reserved for Veterans served through a partnership between Rowan Helping Ministries and the Salisbury Veterans Administration Medical Center. Transitional housing bridges the gap between homelessness and permanent housing, providing case management and supportive services temporarily until the client can become self-sustaining.

The new apartment units are connected to a historic building donated to Rowan Helping Ministries and now renovated to provide space for client case management and specialized mental health services. Housing guests or other clients experiencing a mental health crisis will benefit from the onsite "Living Room" environment which provides a comfortable, calm place where the client and a peer support specialist can de-escalate the crisis, keep the client in stable housing, and avoid hospitalization, when appropriate.

The remainder of the historic building will become the new location of Rowan Helping Ministries' Administrative Offices, including those for the Executive Director, the Controller, the Community Relations staff, and the Support Services staff. Those offices are expected to be moved to the new location by the end of the year.

Moving the Administrative Offices out of The Ketner Center will allow the building to be dedicated to providing program services and to serving more shelter and housing guests, program clients, and citizens who need medical and mental health services. Rowan Helping Ministries partners with Cabarrus-Rowan Community Health Centers (CRCHC) to provide those services on site two days a week. This renovation will help to expand service hours and assist more clients.


