

From the desk of Pastor Mark

During the hot days of summer, we fill our glasses with water to enjoy a drink. Out in the garden, we fill our watering cans so the flowers can grow. We fill, only to empty. This connects to an important theme in Christian theology, as found in one of the Apostle Paul's letters – that *Jesus emptied himself.* "...but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness" (Philippians 2:7).

The key theological word is *kenosis*. Christianity holds that almighty God, the omnipotent and omniscient Creator, emptied God's self of all power & glory, taking on humble human flesh as Jesus of Nazareth. We know of no other time in human history when this happened. As Jesus walked around Galilee, talking to fishermen and tax collectors, and even as he healed the sick and performed miracles, Jesus emptied himself in order to be present. He neither presumed a dominant status, nor did he impose his authority for the sake of keeping others down. Jesus did not let anything get in the way of being present with people.

What if Harrison Ford quietly sat in the back of the movie theater?

Or if Taylor Swift showed up at a restaurant to listen to karaoke night?

Or if the President, Governor, or Mayor unassumingly picked up rubbish along the streets?

And what if the church emptied itself? I believe this is the pathway to continued revitalization, when we discover the joy of *kenosis*.

I suppose we could try another path. Instead of self-emptying, we could show off, flex our muscles, and "put on airs." That pseudo-invitation sounds like, "Come see how great we are!" Whenever the church leads with haughty self-entitlement, we routinely find ourselves frustrated. And it's no wonder – because that's not that way of Christ!

Yes, the pathway to continued revitalization compels us, as the church, to empty ourselves over and over again. This makes space for the Holy Spirit to be present and active within us. When we're not so intent to prove ourselves, we become more eager to serve. In this way, we take part in God's work of healing love.

You and I have seen this through the ministry of First United Methodist Church. I'm thinking about business executives volunteering behind the scenes; medical professionals on mission trips; and even retired clergy pitching in wherever there is need! I could name names, but that seems to contradict the essence of *kenosis*. After all, the only name we're really interested in is Jesus.

How are you called to empty yourself, so that you can offer water for someone who is thirsty?

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Church History

Looking back, moving forward...

Throughout the 18th century, John Wesley was a staunch abolitionist. He and his brother Charles

abhorred the human slave trade. They worked tirelessly to end it. When the first Methodist society members moved to the American colony, former slaves served as lay preachers. When Methodist preachers met in 1784 to form the Methodist Episcopal Church, the conference included two preachers of color, Richard Allen and Harry Hosier. That first conference supported the British Methodist anti-slave trade position. It banned Methodists church members from owning slaves. It also approved lay ethnic preachers to serve African American congregations.

Unfortunately, racism soon prevailed. The ban on slave ownership was rescinded. Then African American preachers were denied sacramental authority. They had to serve under the supervision of an ordained white preacher. In multi-racial congregations, black members were segregated to separate balcony seats. They were often denied access to the altar rail.

On one occasion, a black mother presented her infant son for baptism. When the white preacher asked, "What name is given this child?" she replied, "George Washington." "George Washington!" the preacher shouted in astonishment. "He will not have the name of our great president. I baptize him Caesar. Your name is Caesar."

After years of overt discrimination, some African Americans began their own denomination. Richard Allen established the African Methodist Episcopal Church (AME) in Philadelphia in 1816. A separate African Methodist movement in New York led by James Varick did the same thing in 1820-21. Wanting to distinguish themselves from the AME Philadelphia church, they added the name of their first meeting house "Mother Zion". We know them as the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church or AME Zion.

For all practical purposes the AME and AME Zion church theology and structure copied the white Methodist Episcopal Church they vacated. They had bishops and presiding elders (district superintendents). Both had strong outreach ministries and an educated clergy. A public commitment to the abolitionist movement earned AME Zion the name "The Freedom Church." Their love of learning led to the AME Zion founding of Livingstone College and Hood Theological Seminary.

The Zion Methodists in New York began with only six churches. After the Civil War they sent missionaries south with excellent results. Those workers proclaimed the Gospel and soon had 164,000 members. Most of Salisbury's black Methodists left the Methodist Episcopal Church and became part of this movement, establishing Soldier's Memorial AME Zion church.

Hood Theological Seminary remained a department of Livingstone College until Albert Aymer became its president. Aymer was a United Methodist with a distinguished administrative background at Drew University. On moving to Salisbury, he joined the Western NC Conference as a full clergy member and affiliated with our local congregation. Under his leadership, Hood became an accredited free standing theological seminary. The Rev. Doctors Jim Gilland and Don Haynes played important roles in securing The United Methodist Church's approval for Hood to educate UMC clergy candidates. Both our pastor, Mark Conforti, and this writer occasionally teach at Hood as adjunct faculty members. We are also united with the AME and AME Zion churches as equal members of the Pan-Methodist Commission.

Circle of Welcome

Extending welcome and support to New Americans

Our church is partnering with Lutheran Services Carolinas (LSC), who has opened an office here in Salisbury, to provide a Circle of Welcome for LSC sponsored refugees that will be relocating to the Salisbury area this year. LCS provides assistance with



housing, employment, and introduction into American culture.

What is a Circle of Welcome?

A Circle of Welcome is a team of at least 6-10 people who have committed to walk alongside a matched refugee family for 6 months to one year. Responsibilities for the Circle members includes things like providing a Welcome Kit, transportation from the airport to their initial dwelling place, and a culturally appropriate welcome meal, As the relationship grows Circle members may be involved in helping the newly relocated refugees with weekly tasks like grocery shopping, visits for healthcare clinics, teaching about public transportation, how to use a debit card, and other everyday tasks as they may have a need.

Our church is currently collecting specific items for inclusion in our Welcome Kit that will be presented to our refugee family after their arrival. All of the initial Welcome Kit items have now been donated, but as we learn more about the family who will be arriving, there will be more specific items needed.



Circles of Welcome are designed to provide newly relocated refugees with local people who are committed to engaging together to grow a relationship where the refugees are introduced to American culture while providing an environment where their own culture and traditions can be respected and better understood. The goal at the end of the first year is to have a refugee group being able to navigate the daily tasks of living in the US without a lot of ongoing support from outside entities.

The family we have been matched with is scheduled to arrive in Salisbury on August 3! We welcome church members being engaged and supportive; but, for the privacy of the family, we may not be able to answer every question. Thank you for your understanding as the Circle of Welcome team

balances sharing needs and information while also protecting the family's personal details.

How can I support this mission?

Thanks to the church's generous outpouring of support to the request for household items, we have all the items on the initial Welcome Kit list! Now the Circle of Welcome team is inviting the congregation to give monetary gifts as you feel led. Money donated to the church for the New Americans program will help the team stock the pantry for our family when they arrive, and may be

used to provide other household or clothing items to meet the family's specific needs.
