Do you know the United Methodist Church's stance on gambling? What about the death penalty? On marriage and divorce? There is – believe it or not (literally, whether you believe in it or not) – an official denominational stance on many topics. You can read about them in "The Social Principles."

Our faith compels us to see God's love in the world, for the world, and that this is an active love. We see God making an impact in our own lives and for others. Meanwhile, we cannot sit back as passive observers. Our baptism calls us to participate in God's saving love. This means sharing the Good News so that people can repent of their sins, experience forgiveness, and receive the gift of new life. This also means that we care about other people's lives, too; we care enough to take a stand, including when injustices prevail, even with perplex social matters.

When we get outside of Salisbury, Rowan County, and even the United States, we begin to see how many different kinds of people and communities exist. It's really remarkable! God loves a big world. It's one thing to see the Christian faith where we live. But what about how the Christian faith is embodied by other people in different contexts?

We celebrate the universal truths of the Gospel that transcend culture, language, or preference. At the same time, we humbly recognize just how enormous this world is. As such, The Social Principles of the United Methodist Church are a prayerful and thoughtful effort of the General Conference to speak to the issues in the contemporary world from a sound biblical and theological foundation. You may agree wholeheartedly with the precise articulation of one particular principle, and simultaneously disagree with the wording of another. At the same time, a fellow United Methodist church member may hold a different perspective than you, and we can all be part of the same church. As one pastor friend says, "We won't kick you out for buying a lottery ticket."

What are the chances of every United Methodist church member being in complete agreement with each other, let alone all of The Social Principles? You know the answer: zip! Or how about another question... What are the chances of a married person being in complete agreement with his or her spouse? And yet, despite the high divorce rate, an uncountable number of married couples stay married. They learn how to live together, to raise a family together, to remain faithful to one another as they grow old together.

The Church is old! It goes all the way back to when Jesus called those first fishermen. They dropped their nets, followed Jesus, and learned how to fish for people. Since then, the story of the Church consists of beautiful moments of devout commitment to the gospel, and other times when the ugliness of sin rips apart people, families, and communities.


If you're like me, then you are excited to be part of Jesus' continuing Church. It consists of people



Church History

Saint Valentine's Day turns our hearts to love. We celebrate with boxes of candy, cut flowers, ornate greeting cards, and/or the cook's night out. It is an occasion to say: I love you.

Love also stands at the heart of Methodism. The theological word is GRACE. It means God loves us. Hate has no place in our church. We believe we are loved by God, and God wants us to love everyone. This idea of God's grace permeates every aspect of our faith including our music.

John Wesley's brother Charles is best remembered for his hymns. They often capture our grace filled theology. One of his best-known hymns is "Love Divine, All Loves Excelling." It identifies Christ as "pure, unbounded love," and prays that God's love might "enter every trembling heart." My wife and I used it as the processional hymn at our wedding.

Surprisingly, scholars believe this hymn had a secular beginning. The 17th century English poet, John Dryden, included in his play King Arthur, a

"Song of Venus." The opening line begins, "Fairest Isles, all Isles excelling, Seat of Pleasures and of love." It goes on to celebrate Venus the Roman goddess of passionate love. Charles Wesley knew this poem and adapted its lines to proclaim God's perfecting love.

Like many of his hymns, "Love Divine" was constantly edited. Its most controversial line occurs in the second verse. Later editions omitted it. Verse two asks God to "Take away our bent to sinning." Early Methodists argued that if humanity loses its "bent to sinning," it will lose its free will. Our very humanity would be diminished by not having the freedom of choice. Some later versions changed the line to "take away our love of sinning."

This hymn beautifully praises the Methodist doctrine of Christian perfection. Methodists don't believe we can make ourselves perfect in love. That is humanly impossible. However, the Wesley brothers strongly felt we should want God to make us perfect in love. It should be the desire of every Christian's heart and something we earnestly seek. Anything less than perfect love leaves room for improvement. If we are to be "changed from glory into glory" it must be by God's gracious gift that we both seek and accept.

John Zundel (1815-1882) composed the music for this hymn. He was a native of Germany who began his career as an organist in St. Petersburg, Russia. After seven years, he moved to America. For thirty years, he lived in New York and is best known for his long association with Henry Ward Beecher at Plymouth Church, Brooklyn. He later returned to Germany where he died in 1882.

As we enter a New Year, it is a good time for Christians to ask God to "Finish, then thy new creation, pure and spotless let us be." Growing in God's grace is the perfect path to a heavenly joy where we can be "lost in wonder, love, and praise."



Ecclesia: Newsletter

A Cappella Sunday



February 18th is the First Sunday in Lent. To mark the beginning of this important season of penitence and preparation, we are joining with worshipping communities from across the world in singing congregational songs a cappella (without instrumental accompaniment) during the Sunday morning worship services. By singing a cappella, we are offering to God ourselves in its most basic form. Soli Deo Gloria! Glory to God Alone!

Spending one Sunday a year to focus on a cappella congregational singing has many benefits and purposes, including:

- 1.It connects us to the history of the church. For thousands of years, a cappella singing was the mainstay of the Church's song. By exploring this way of music-making, we acknowledge the saints of the past.
- 2. It connects us to many Christian denominations, traditions, and regions of the world that continue to primarily use a cappella music in corporate worship. Including many Mennonite, Church of Christ, Church of God in Christ, South African Methodists, and Orthodox traditions.
- 3. It offers to God something that is, for many congregations in North America, a gift that is different from our usual music-making. Psalm 96.1 tells us to "Sing a new song to the LORD," which can be achieved for some of us by singing a cappella.
- 4. It encourages the congregation's song by building up confidence in their own voices. Many in our congregation believe that they can't sing, or can't sing well. Singing a cappella presents these people with the best opportunity to hear themselves and others singing, giving them a fresh perspective on their assumptions of their own abilities and the ability of the congregation's combined voice.
- 5. It emphasizes the unique ability of instruments to enhance the congregation's song. By showing the congregation that they can sing without instrumental accompaniment, instrumental accompaniment can then begin to enhance and empower the congregation's voice rather than acting primarily as a crutch. Singing a cappella also allows us to more intentionally focus upon the texts we are singing and meditate upon their biblical truths.
- 6. It allows instrumentalists to spend a Sunday listening carefully to the congregation to assess where their voice needs support. Often times it is hard to listen carefully to the congregation when you are focusing on playing your instrument accurately and musically. This gives the instrumentalists permission to step away for a Sunday without feeling like they are leaving the congregation stranded.
- 7. Finally, singing a cappella is fun! By removing our typical means of accompanying song, our minds are often challenged to come up with new and creative ways to sing together that maintains energy and vitality. It can bring out the best in not only the congregation, but in the musician's leadership.

The global pandemic, as well as extended waits for visas, eventually pushed the gathering to April 23 – May 3, 2024.
