From the Pastor page 3

Re:Marks

As we journey through the sacred season of Lent, we are called to introspection and spiritual renewal. Lent is a season of preparation, a time for us to reflect on the suffering of Jesus Christ, and to discern how we might more closely align our lives with Him.

This year, I'm inviting us to consider closely the "seven deadly sins." These are not simply a list of moral infractions, but rather they represent attitudes and behaviors that can separate us from God and from one another. These sins represent, as I like to put it, "the contorted condition of our humanity." To remind you, the Seven Deadly Sins are:

Pride Envy Anger Sloth Greed Gluttony Lust

From a broad view, each of these sins potentially disrupts our lives, our families, and our community. By recognizing these sins, we can better understand our own lives. This includes identifying the common traps that frequently overwhelm us. For example, the trap of comparison (e.g. comparing our car to our neighbor's car, or comparing our summer vacation to a friend's vacation) leads to envy.

One sin leads to another vice. In this way, each one is indeed deadly. Our own lives become diminished, and our relationships suffer demise. Pride, for example, can lead us to believe that we are better than others, while envy can cause us to resent the good fortune of others. Anger can lead to violence and division, while sloth can prevent us from fulfilling our responsibilities. Greed can cause us to hoard resources at the expense of others, while gluttony can lead to overindulging. And lust can cause us to objectify others and even to prioritize our own desires over their well-being.

During this Lenten season, the Sunday sermons will focus on these first five. In this way, we look inward to examine ourselves & repent. Then as we approach Holy Week, when we witness Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, when we look again upon Christ on the cross, we can potentially encounter the world's sin.

I encourage you to reflect on these "seven deadly sins" and to consider how they may be present in your own life. And as we do...

May we honestly assess the presence and impact of these sins on us. May we be open to God's grace at work within us, so that these sins do not devastate us.

May this Lenten season be a time of deep spiritual growth and renewal for all of us.

HAVE YOU EVER FOUND YOURSELF DRIVING IN THE THICKEST OF FOG?



Church History

You can't be a Christian by yourself. Spiritual beliefs are personal and private. Religion is communal. We need each other. Faithful discipleship involves working and worshiping together. In Matthew 18:20, Jesus says, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, I am there among them (NRSV)." To know Jesus is to know him in community.

Methodism's founder, John Wesley, believed in faith sharing conferences. As early as June 25, 1744, his diary records Methodism's first religious conference. He called together a few of the movement's preachers to explore three questions: What to teach, how to teach, and what to do.

Until his death in 1791, John Wesley was the movement's undisputed leader. He personally appointed lay preachers and supervised all aspects of their ministry. He also sought the wisdom of others through conferences.

By 1784, two issues threatened Methodism's future. Conferences resolved both challenges. First, mortality threatened Wesley's leadership. He was over 80 years old. He reluctantly agreed to a DEED OF DECLARATION that legally established institutional Methodism. The deed created self-perpetuating conferences with the authority to appoint pastors and deal with all legal and religious matters.

The second challenge came from America. The Revolutionary War ended. United States citizens refused to follow Wesley's pro-British leadership. They needed a church in America with ordained clergy who could administer the sacraments of Baptism and Holy Communion. Wesley personally ordained Thomas Coke, Richard Whatcoat, and Tomas Vasey before sending them to America to ordain the lay preachers.

In 1784, Methodist circuit riding preachers covered all thirteen original states. At John Wesley's written request, Freeborn Garrettson summoned them to Baltimore for what became known as the Christmas Conference. At this meeting, the delegates unanimously and enthusiastically voted to create the Methodist Episcopal Church. John Wesley's representatives ordained the lay preachers. The conference elected Francis Asbury and Thomas Coke as their superintendents or bishops. It also established a college called Cokesbury, a book concern to publish the new church's literature, and allowed "worn out preachers" to retire.

Only clergy attended those early conferences. As the church grew, laity insisted on having both voice and vote in church affairs. In 1830, one predecessor denomination of the UMC approved having an equal number of lay and clergy conference delegates. Other branches of Methodism followed their example though that change in one branch took over a hundred years.

The Methodist Episcopal Church expanded rapidly and needed additional conferences. Local churches held quarterly conferences conducted by a presiding elder (later district superintendent). There were District, Annual, and Jurisdictional conferences for specific purposes and geographical areas. Every four years, a General Conference of the entire denomination still meets. It is the only body authorized to speak for the whole denomination. Our next General Conference will convene on April 23rd in Charlotte, NC.

The idea of holy conferencing goes all the way back to Jesus. In conferences, Methodists listen to and learn from each other. We believe Christ joins us when we gather in his name. Simply put, we are better together.






EASTER FLOWERS



Preparing for General Conference

General Conference info session April 15, 6:00pm

The Conference. next General rescheduled to meet Apr 23-May 3 in Charlotte, NC, will have 862 delegates. Half of these delegates are clergy, and half are laity. Each has been elected by their peers at Annual Conferences. Clergy elect clergy delegates, and laity elect laity delegates who must be professing members of a United Methodist church for at least two years, and active in their church for at least the last four years.

Where are Delegates coming from?

56% of the delegates are from the United States

~44% of the delegates will come from outside the United States.

(32% from Africa, 6% percent from the Philippines and 4.5% from Europe.)
