Re:Marks

A conversation Jesus had two thousand years ago carries relevance for us today. We read about this in John chapter 4, when Jesus was standing near a well.

A Samaritan woman walked within proximity to Jesus, close enough that she could hear him say, "Give me a drink." Evidently the disciples had gone into the nearby city to buy food, leaving Jesus by himself. Ordinarily, a Hebrew man would not strike up a conversation with a Samaritan woman. The social conventions of the day would not allow it. The woman pointed this out to Jesus, who responded, "If you knew the gift of God, and who it is that is saying to you, 'Give me a drink,' you would have asked him, and would have given you living water."

For us to engage this biblical story, we would do well to ask ourselves two simple questions:

- Do we know the gift of God?
- Do we know who it is that is talking?

If so, then we will be ready to receive "living water." According to Jesus, when we drink this living water, we will never thirst again. The woman quickly realizes that this water cannot be drawn up from the well in a bucket.

And you and I know that this living water cannot come out of our faucets. For the women at the well and for us today, Jesus' tangible illustration invites us to imagine God's grace. Everyone gets thirsty. Everyone needs water. And everyone who receives the living water of God's grace will be satisfied!

Jesus' conversation with this woman does not end with simply sipping water. There's much more! Jesus eventually reveals himself as the Messiah, and then talks about worshipping in "spirit and truth." That phrase is repeated, thus demonstrated emphasis, to describe those who are true worshippers. Taken all together, our imaginations taste God's grace – it breaks down barriers, prompting people to worship in spirit and truth.

Let's worship "in spirit and truth." Yes, this should be the case every time we gather for worship, though I am especially thinking about the month of October. Every Sunday is special for different reasons. Different liturgical acts and themes will signify each Sunday, guiding our hearts and minds to reflect on God's grace every time.

What does worshipping God "in spirit and truth" mean? When we open ourselves to the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, we begin to notice the following shifts during the worship experience:

We let go of the reigns, and we care more about what God wants than what we want

The preferences we treasure fade away, and we care more about the needs of others than our own

The hang-ups from the past no longer matter, and we care more about the present moment with God and the Body of Christ

The living water we taste during worship will guide us to the Truth, who is Jesus!

Stewardship Commitment Sunday, October 8




October 8 is Commitment Sunday!







Church History

Methodists have a rich and diverse worship tradition. Our founder, John Wesley, was a priest in the Church of England. He once wrote, "there is no Liturgy in the world, either in ancient or modern language, which breathes more of a solid scriptural, rational piety, than the Common Prayer of the Church of England." When American Methodists formed the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1784, Wesley sent them a slightly modified version of the Anglican Book of Common Prayer. His edited version eliminated a few items and shortened the service. However, he expected American Methodists to worship the same way as those in the Church of England.



Early Methodist worship was also known for enthusiastic singing. Thanks to the hymns of John Wesley's brother, Charles, making a joyful noise became a key characteristic of Methodism. If you read his verses in a modern hymnal, you will see how Methodists sang their theology.

American Methodism particularly thrived at Camp Meetings. These outdoor gatherings embodied the English Methodist tradition of field preaching. Living on isolated farms, many settlers had few opportunities to attend church services. Camp meetings were scheduled for times when most farmers had completed seasonal chores. People gathered at a preannounced site. They lived in tents, covered wagons, or crudely constructed huts. Preaching, singing, and bible reading continued all day. As one preacher ended his sermon another would step up to take his place. Camp Meetings were also important social reunions. Many a young person met their spouse at a Camp Meeting.

Wesley's high Anglican liturgy became mixed in America with revivalism. A Methodist circuit rider might visit a new frontier farm and receive overnight accommodations. In the evening, he would instruct the children and lead a simple worship service including hymns, prayers, scripture, and maybe a sermon. On later visits, if the congregation expanded to include neighbors, they would construct a temporary brush arbor or a small building for worship. The order of worship at both home and church remained very simple.

When our Salisbury congregation moved from a log cabin to a fine downtown brick sanctuary, worship services likely included elements of both formal ritual and informal revivalism. The *Book of Discipline* provided specific rituals for Holy Communion, Baptism, Funerals, and Weddings but not for Sunday worship.

For much of our congregation's history, the first half of the Sunday service included liturgical items such as a Call to Worship, Hymns, Prayer of Confession, Responsive Reading, Apostles' Creed, *Gloria Patri*, Announcements, Scripture lesson, and Pastoral Prayer. The order of these items differed from church to church, pastor to pastor, and Sunday to Sunday; but they always included an offering. (My father usually served as an usher and referred to this first part of the service as the "preliminaries.")

The sermon came after the offering. For many worshipers like my father, the sermon was the "main event." It provided a strong link to revivalism. Church members even renamed their pastor "Preacher." After a sermon, the service closed with a final hymn, an act of commitment or altar call, and a benediction. Many Methodist churches still follow this basic pattern.



What is your role on staff?

I am a seminary intern. My role is to attend staff and worship meetings, participate in Sunday worship and make pastoral care visits. I hope to either be a Pastoral Care Associate Minister at a church or a hospital chaplain. Before coming to FUMC Salisbury I was the Director of Missions and Witness at Williamson's Chapel UMC.

Tell us about your family:

My husband of twenty years, Chris, works as the VP of Sustainability at Lowes Corporate. He has a passion for taking care of the world we live in and for social justice and gets to pursue both in his career. He loves spending time in the mountains, playing golf and gaming. My oldest son, Ali, is originally from Afghanistan. He officially joined our family four and a half years ago. He is a junior in high school and loves to play soccer. He works hard at everything he does and has a smile that lights up a room. My daughter, Julia, is fifteen and in ninth grade. She is a true artist. Tell us about your call to ministry:

We have all been called to be Christ's hands and feet in this world; to love and serve one another. A moment when I sensed my calling to ordained ministry specifically happened while serving communion over ten years ago... Some things had taken place that left me sad and upset with several of the members of the church at the time. Despite my hurt feelings, I showed up to serve as I had been asked. That morning, while serving people who had deeply hurt me, I looked into each person's eyes and shared the words, "This is Christ's blood, shed for you." I saw them in a different light. I looked at them through God's eyes, not my own. Christ had died and loved every single one of these people. He shed is blood for each of them. The nourishment of communion took on a whole new meaning for me. There were many events that followed throughout the years that brought me to where I am now but I guess you could sum it up by saying I want to bring people to Christ's Table and share God's love with them.

What has your experience been like at FUMC so far?

Being at FUMC has been a life-giving experience for me. The genuine love and grace of God can be seen in all of it's members and the staff. The very first day I was there a homeless man walked in right in the middle of the service and walked down the middle isle. Nancy passed her hymnal to him and pointed to where we were in our song. Everyone was so genuine, kind and loving. I knew this was a good place then and there. Also in a time when pastors have been burning out, it is so refreshing to be around Pastor Mark. He has a passion for Christ that is evident in all he does. I am looking forward to learning as much as I possibly can from his guidance and example.










Scouting at FUMC: Troop 442

Have you noticed the upgraded signage our ushers have been displaying on Sunday mornings?



Voting members of Church Council include committee chairpersons, the council chair, church lay leader, and a few other positions.
